3COMMON MISTAKES

1. Applying for only one or two scholarships.









TIP: Winning multiple small scholarships adds up! Smaller awards are usually less competitive so your chances of winning improve.

TIP: Start early! Get your application done well before the deadline so you don't have to rush.

2. Missing deadlines.

3. Counting yourself out because of grades.

TIP: Grades aren't everything! There are plenty of scholarships based on extracurriculars, financial need and qualities like leadership.

ADDITIONAL TIPS

1. Build portfolios documenting your activities and accomplishments so you have stories to tell.

2. Check your bank, parents' employers, and insurance company to find opportunitites.

3. Apply to OSAP to see if you're eligible for grants. You can always take the grant and opt out of the loan.

4. Take the time to analyze the application's essay topic and book an appointment with writing coaches to review your submission.

5. Research is key – try every source! Talk to people, use various resources including scholarship websites, the Student Financial Aid & Scholarships Office, posters and libraries to find opportunities.
